Farewell Malinda Baker!

Yolo County Library would like to acknowledge and express its gratitude to Esparto Branch Supervisor, Malinda Baker, for her almost 15 years of service to the residents of the Capay Valley and the County of Yolo. Malinda will be retiring from County service in January 2021. She earned her Bachelor's degree from New Mexico State University and a Master's degree in Library Science from the University of Denver. Malinda moved to the Capay Valley in 1985 and, with her husband, raised two wonderful children. She was hired to run the Esparto Regional Library in March 2006, after spending over 11 years with Full Belly Farms.

Malinda has done wonderful work bringing a variety of rich and diverse programs to the Capay Valley community. She led Yolo County Library's county-wide annual Dia de los Ninos program, including procurring grants to enhance the events, supported the annual Summer Reading Program, and led the Library's yearly participation in the Cover-to-Cover reading program. She also worked closely with the Friends activities with local artists, English as a Second Language classes, and music and other family-friendly performances.

Over the years, Malinda helped plan and implement several initiatives aimed at reducing barriers to library services, including developing library accounts for non-profits and educational organizations, working on procedures so that individuals unable to show proof of residency could register for library accounts, and creating procedures for issuing library cards as part of school visits.

Malinda excelled in collaborating with local partners, including RISE and Mercy Housing. In her work with the Esparto Unified School District, she helped implement the Student Success Initiative, resulting in all

EUSD students receiving library cards and all youth no longer being charged late fees. In 2018, Malinda worked with library management and her branch team to implement expanded hours at the Esparto Regional Library to better serve the needs of the students and the community.

time weaving, quilting, hiking,
bird watching, and enjoying
more activities with family and

Parenting in a Pandemic Sherrie Vann - Principal

Parenting is hard when everything is "normal"; parenting in a pandemic can seem impossible. As we have been navigating through this difficult time has been more important than ever to help and support each other and our children. through our parnership with RISE, Inc., our counselor Melissa Chavez and Raquel Luna facilitated an English and a Spanish workshop designed to support parents. There will be more workshops in the future and I encourage you all to join in!

At school we have been planning and implemeniting Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). The simple premise is, if we teach our students the explicit expectations for any given school environment they will know how to behave. We praise positive behavior consistently and often. You may have already seen our monthly video awards assemblies, which is one small way we are honoring our students for their postive behavior.

PBIS can be extended to home with great success. Please read more about PBIS at home in the **Supporting Families With PBIS At Home.** PBIS can be effectively used at home too and is especially helpful when events disrupt normal routines (e.g., worldwide health pandemics, natural disasters, extended breaks).

Setting routines at home will help children thrive. When schools are not in session, students may have fewer predictable routines, which can increase their anxiety and challenging behaviors. To cut down on behavior problems, families and caregivers can mimic school routines with their children and set up times for learning, exercise, and play. It's helpful if these routines are similar to what students are already familiar with from school. The home schedule needs to be posted in a visible central place for all to see. The more consistent the routines and schedule can be, the easier it will be to support prosocial behavior and prevent challenging behavior in the home.

At school with PBIS we teach, remind, and reward expected behaviors with positive feedback. Doing so at home is much more powerful with a plan to teach. remind, and reward bhaviors using positive feedback. Emphasizing respect, responsibility, and a sense of community is important for maintaining a smooth home-school connections.

You or your child might be experience stress and anxiety during this time of extended school closure. Everyone reacts differently to stressful situations and how you respond will make an impact on your child and the other individuals in your household. (Center on PBIS, 2020)

Happy Holidays From Esparto Elementary!

As this year comes to an end and Winter Break is upon us, this is a great time to read or listen to classic stories like Twas the Night Before Christmas, The Polar Express, and A Christmas Carol. Reading with your child and Christmas story is a great way to inspire them to read. Sharing with them your favorite story will motivate them to read as well. This is one ereason why at the Elementary School we urge our kids to be on Lexia, an interactive reading program, for their target minutes each week. As they enter Lexia their target minutes are displayed and can range from 30 to 80 per week depending on the child's learning needs. Lexia will help them with their phonological awareness, phonics, structual analysis, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. We also have our Books with Lunch program that allows students to take some books home with them when they pick up their lunch.

The PBIS (Postive Behavioral Intervention and supports) committee has been working hard to have the program set up for when students arrive back on campus. They have been working on multiple areas and are excited to share it with our students and families. It is not easy work, but we are excited to get it going and continue to provide a safe place for our staff and students.





Yolo County Issues Revised Quarantine Order

(Woodland, CA) - Yolo County has adopted the California Department of Public Health's (CPDH) recent quarantine guidance for COVID-19 and updates its **local Quarantine Order**, That was initially announced on July 24 and later revised on October 27. Yolo County recognized that a 14-day quarantine may pose a significant economic and mental health burden and may not be possible for certain workers.

Effective immediately, the updated Quarantine Health Order states that:

- Asymptomatic close contacts may discontinue quarantine 10 days after the date of last exposure without testing. All contacts released from quarantine before 14 days must:
 - Self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms through day 14. If symptoms develop, they must immediately isolate and seek testing.
 - Wear a face covering and maintain at least 6 feet of distance from others through day 14.

There are 3 execptions to the standard 10-day quarantine:

- Asymptomatic close contacts who are health care workers, emergency responders, or social service workers in the child welfare system or long-term care facilities may discontinue quarantine 7 days after the date of last exposure if a Polymerase Chain Reactions (PCR) test performed after day 5- post exposure provides a negative result.
 - This 7-day-with-negative-test approach should only be used during staffing shortages.
 - Contacts must wear surgical face masks at all times during work and continue to wear face coverings when outside the home through 14 days after their last exposure. They must also self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms through day 14 and immediately isolate and seek testing if symptoms develop.
 - Contacts are released from quarantine only to work and to travel to work and to travel to and from work and must otherwise quarantine for 10 days as above.
- During critical staffing shortages (when patient care would otherwise be threatened), asymptomatic health care workers may continue to work after an exposure
 - Contacts must wear surgical face masks at all times during work and continue to wear face coverings when outside the home through 14 days after their last exposure. They must also self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms through day 14 and immediately isolate and seek testing if symptoms develop.
 - Contacts are released from quarantine only to work and to travel to and from work and must otherwise quarantine for 10 days as above
- People who reside or work in high-risk congregate living settings (such as long-term care facilities, prisons, jails, or shelters) or people who reside or work with severely immunocompromised individuals (such as bone marrow or solid organ transplant recipients or person undergoing chemotherapy) must continue to quarantine for 14 days after an exposure or upon admission to the facility.
 - The requirement for a 14-day quarantine is based on serious consequences of disease spread in this highly vulnerable population. Exceptions to the required 14-day quarantine for this population may be requested in writing from the Health Officer in cases of critical staffing shortages where continuity of operations is in jeopardy.

On December 14, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) issued COVID-19 **Quarantine Guidance** based on the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's updated recommendations to include options to reduce quarantine for contacts of persons with COVID-19. CDPH now allows people who have no symptoms to quarantine for only 10 days after a close-contact exposure to someone with COVID-19. CDPH limits the use of the 7-day quarantine period with a negative test to only certain health care, emergency response, and social service workers. CDPH also notes that there are settings, such as skilled nursing facilities, in which a 14-day quarantine period should be maintained.

The County will also be revising the local travel advisory to shorten the recommended self-quarantine period to 10 days. Free Tree Recycling and Holiday Closures

Release Date: December 21, 2020

(Woodland, CA) - From December 26 through January 15, residents are welcome to recycle their holiday trees at the Yolo County Central Landfill, located at 44090 County road 28H in Woodland, and the Esparto Convenience Center, located at 27075 County Road 19A in Esparto. Tree-cycling turns holiday trees into a valuable. renewable and recycleable resource as trees are biodegradable and will eventually decompose to provide essential organic matter. Residents should ensure that trees are free of all ornaments, flocking, tinsel, garland and lights. Please note that this program is only for Yolo County residents and there is a limit of two trees per customer for free recycling.

In addition, residents can safely dispose of, or recycle, waste at the Landfill, which regularly holds weekly collection of household hazardous waste on Fridays and Saturdays from 7:30am to 3:30pm, except on holidays. The Esparto Convenience Center transfer station provides free recycling of glass, plastics, mixed paper and metals as well as used oil, filters, cardboard and e-waste on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 9:30am to 3:30pm, except on holidays.

Both the Landfill and the Esparto station will be closed on Friday, December 25 for Christmas and Friday, January 1 to New Year's Day. All services, including hazardous waste drop and transfer station activities will be resume Saturday, December 26.

Yolo County District Attorney's Neighborhood Court Program Seeks Volunteers

(Woodland, CA) - December 14, 2020 - The Yolo County District Attorney's Neighborhood Court (NHC) Program is seeking volunteer panelists. Trainings are set to take place virtually in January, 2021.

NHC, which has been in operation since June of 2013, is an innovative restorative justice diversionary program within the Yolo County District Attorney's Office. NHC also includes the Steps to Success (S2S) program, which is geard towards offenders experiencing challenges due to mental health and addiction issues.

NHC conferences are staffed by local volunteers who facilitate and hear criminal cases to develop agreements with the offenders aimed at providing individualized outcomes, using the principles of restorative justice. This process provides a voice for members of the community, and those affected by crimes, to express how they have been harmed and what they need in order to make things right.

Program outcomes are designed to address the underlying issues affecting participants while prioritizing their acceptance of responsibility and reparation of harms to the community and any direct victim affected. These conferences function best by involving a diverse group of volunteers who represent their local communities. Agreements created through this process are designed to educate and address underlying issues affecting participants, while aslo emphasizing acceptance of responsability by encouraging actions that focus on reparation of harms to the community and any direct victim affected, as well as self-reflection.

Panelist service hours are flexible. Through their input, volunteers are able to positively impact the trajectory of participants' lives. We asked Woodland Panelist Alexis Olmedo about her experience as a volunteer and she explained, "I want to make a difference in our community by supporting others and helping offenders gain and insight into the problems that led to their offense. To restore justice for all parties within the community."


NHC volunteers receive training in the basic principles of restorative justive and the three-step Neighborhood Court conference process. The NHC panelist training course is a prerequisite for service in any of the DA's restorative justice programs. The Evolution of a Conjuction

We live on a planet in a solar system which is one of billions of solar systems in our galaxy. For most of us, the Jupiter/Saturn great conjuction was seen just this once. For thos who doubt, we have visual evidence that the planets move. What appears below is a brief record of the evolution of a planetary conjunction. The evidence is presented.

- 1. As we can see only July 5, 2020, there is a large separation between Jupiter, the brighter object near the moon and Saturn, the dimmer object to the left. We will see that planets and the moon are all in constant motion! (Taken at 4:58am.)
- 2. We can see the separation is somewhat less on August 1st, 2020. The moon has gone through one cycle and is now in a new position. Jupiter is the brighter object, Saturn is the dimmer! (Taken at 9:50pm)
- 3. On December 6th 2020, again we notice that the distance between the two planets has lessen. The planets are moving in space as well as relative to each other. The images were captured at different times of the night. A normalization would show that the planets are moving from East to West in Earth's sky! The planets actual motion is West to Easst independent of the Earth's motion! (Taken at 5:48pm)
- 4. This image was taken on December 17th 2020. The moon as a reference is an indication of how pronounced the movement of Jupiter and Saturn has been over these several observations! on December 21st the two planets will be in the closest conjuction between them that has occurred in the last 800 years! (Taken at 6:04pm)
- 5. December 20, 2020 5:52pm. Jupiter and Saturn appear close together. Difficult image, sky was very cloudy.
- 6. December 21, 2020. All images were taken in Esparto. As many of you might remember, Monday the 21st of December it was clouded over in Esparto.



Capay Valley Flora, Fuana, and Farms series From Capay Valley Regeneration Local Mushrooms

Earth Star mushrooms, Astraeus pteridis, start pushing up through the soil as soon as the winter rain begins. Look for these star shaped mushrooms, measuring several inches across, under oak trees throughout the Capay Valley. The unusual shape is made up of a tough outer skin that splits open into star like rays with a ball shaped center. The rays are hygroscopic meaning that the rays of the mushroom will expand or contract according to the moisture in the atmosphere. The center of the mushroom is a thin-skinned sac that opens when mature to disburse powdery spores that are spread by the wind or rain droplets. The spore sac then collapses and deterioates but the rays of the star darken and persist on the ground for some time. These star shaped mushrooms are the fruiting bodies of soil dwelling mycelium that have a mutually beneficial relationship with the oaks.
